CBB New Books and Media Search Tool

The Library is pleased to announce the launch of the CBB New Books and Media search tool, accessible from the <u>library web</u> <u>site</u> and from within <u>CBBcat</u>. Use the tool to generate a list of materials recently acquired by Colby, Bates, and Bowdoin libraries.



- Search by format for books, e-books, DVDs, audio books, CDs, scores, and government documents.
- Search on a particular subject area (books, e-books, DVDs only).
- Limit results by language and library location (Colby, Bates, or Bowdoin).
- Choose a time frame: most recent 7, 30, or 90 days.
- View results as a web page (full-featured or printer-friendly), or send in an email. The CBB libraries continue to consider ways to enhance access to our shared library collection and we hope you will take advantage of the New Books and Media search tool to keep up to date with new acquisitions. Retirement of NExpress

On Monday, May 1st we bid farewell to the NExpress Resource Sharing service. Over the past several years, due to changes in individual library systems, the number of NExpress participants has dwindled. This spring CBB and our two remaining partners,

Middlebury and Wellesley, jointly decided to retire the service. CBB and MaineCat selfrequesting are unchanged and Bowdoin will continue to enjoy expedited borrowing from Middlebury and Wellesley with requests submitted through ILL. This streamlined approach to accessing materials beyond Maine libraries provides additional benefits for users. <u>Read more »</u>

New Spaces in H-L Library will Support Collaborative Research

Two renovation projects are planned for the 1st floor of Hawthorne-Longfellow Library this summer that will both enhance student space and improve access to staff. The study area adjacent to the suite of librarian offices on the south side of the floor will be enlarged to create a Research Commons. This re-envisioned space will support active learning and collaborative work among students and between

students and Librarian Liaisons. At the same time, staff from <u>Academic Technology &</u> <u>Consulting (AT&C)</u> will move to the space currently occupied by the Library's Technical Services Department, on the north side of the floor. The move will provide AT&C with a more visible location on campus and support the department's efforts to engage actively with faculty and students. <u>Read more »</u>





Howard Papers Digitization Complete

The three-year, grant-funded Howard Papers Digitization Project is now complete. The nineteenth-century manuscript collections of Civil War General Oliver Otis Howard and his brothers, Charles and Rowland, are now <u>available online</u> in their entirety. Over the course of the project, 26 student employees scanned nearly 180,000 images. Indexes of O.O. Howard's correspondence are also now available online and include links to the digitized version of each letter. This project was generously funded by the National Historical Publications and Records Commission and the Morton-Kelly Charitable Trust. <u>Read more »</u>
